

Kellys Directory Extract 1867 Berwick Bassett



Berwick Bassett (or Barwick Bassett) is a township and parish, in the Northern division of the county, Calne hundred, Marlborough union and county court district, diocese of Salisbury, archdeaconry of Wilts, and rural deanery of Avebury, 9 miles north-west from Marlborough, and 7 south from Wootton Bassett station. The church of St. Nicholas is a neat stone structure, in the Early English style; has been repaired and re-seated, the chancel and cupola, with 3 bells, being entirely new: in the east window is some stained glass; here is also a very ancient font, and a very handsome carved oak rood screen. The register dates from 1674. The living is a donative, with £300 per annum, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held by the Rev. Edward John Vicary, of Trinity Hall, Cambridge; the Re. Peter Cornelius West is curate. There is a National school. Henry Stratton, Esq., is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Lady Holland and Henry Stratton Esq. The soil is loam; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and beans. The area is 1,388 acres and the population in 1861 was 171.
