## Bishopstone (Wilton)



BISHOPSTONE (Near Salisbury) is a parish and village in the Southern division of the county, Downton hundred, Wilton union and parliamentary borough, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry, and Chalke rural deanery, 6 miles south-west from Salisbury, 4 south from Wilton, and 90 from London. The church of St. John the Baptist handsome cruciform Gothic structure: it has a square embattled tower rising from the centre with 3 bells: the altar service was presented, in 1663, by Bishop Earle, who had been formerly a rector of the parish. The register dates from about 1625. The living is a rectory and vicarage, worth £760, with 29 acres of glebe land and residence, in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke, and held by the Rev. Francis Lear, M.A., of Christ Church, Oxford, precentor and canon residentiary of Salisbury. There is a National school in the village, which was built by the Rev. George A. Montgomery, and is now supported by subscription; there is also a Dissenting chapel. The river Ebele passes through the parish. The Pembroke family have been lords of the manor since 1663. The principle landowner is the Earl of Pembroke. The soil and subsoil are chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, and turnips. The parish extends over 4,452 acres, with a population in 1861 of 685.

FAULSTON (or Fallston), FLAMSTON, CROUCHESTON, and NATON (OR Netton), are hamlets near each other, about a mile west; THROOPE is also a hamlet.
