Charles PENRUDDOCKE

Charles Penruddocke was born on 16th January, 1893 in Bath, Somerset. He was the second born of six children to parents Charles Penruddocke & Annie Elizabeth Dickinson Carew Bamford Speke.

The 1901 Census records Charles Penruddocke as an 8 year old living with his parents – Charles Penruddocke, aged 42, living on own means & Annie Penruddocke, aged 33 at Compton Park, Compton Chamberlayne. Charles's 4 siblings were also recorded – Flora, aged 10, George W, aged 6, Letitia, aged 5 & Thomas, aged 3. Also recorded were in the household were a Governess, Butler, Cook, Upper housemaid, under housemaid & Kitchen maid. (Sybil Penruddocke – twin to George is not listed).

Charles Penruddocke of the Army Service Corp, 1st South Western Mounted Brigade Transport and Supply Column, was appointed to Second Lieutenant on 29th July, 1910. (*Source: The Times August* 10th, 1910)

Second Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke of the Army Service Corp, 1st South Western Mounted Brigade Transport and Supply Column resigned his commission form 25th February, 1914. (Source: The Times February 25th, 1914)

As Britain had declared war on Germany, Charles Penruddocke rejoined the Army & was appointed to Temporary Second Lieutenant from January 1st, 1915. (Source: The Times, March 24, 1915)

Charles Penruddocke was appointed Temporary Lieutenant from 1st July, 1916. (Source: The Times, February 16, 1917.)

Charles Penruddocke's youngest brother -Second Lieutenant Thomas Penruddocke served with the 8th Battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment. He was killed in action on 25th April, 1917, aged 19 years & is remembered on the Doiran Memorial in Greece, as he has no known grave.

An engagement notice for Charles Penruddocke was placed in *The Times* newspaper on 6^{th} October, 1917 :-

MR C. PENRUDDOCKE AND MISS SHORE

The engagement is announced of Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke, Wiltshire Regiment, elder son of Mr Charles Penruddocke, J.P. for Somerset and Wilts, of Compton Park, near Salisbury, and Evelyn Lorna Russell, youngest daughter of C. R. Shore, of Barns Gates, Binfield, near Bracknell.

2nd Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke was appointed to Lieutenant from 1^{st} January, 1918. (Source: London Gazette, 7^{th} June, 1918.)

Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke served with "C" Company of the 7th Battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment.

He was killed in action on 4th October, 1918, aged 25 years. Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke is buried in Plot I. J. 22 of the Templeux-Le-Guerard British Cemetery and is acknowledged with a Commonwealth War Graves Headstone.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke as the son of Charles and Annie E. Penruddocke, of Compton Park, Salisbury.

Lieutenant Charles Penruddocke was entitled to the 1914-15 Star, British War & Victory Medals. His Medal Index Card shows he had entered a Theatre of War firstly in Greece in September, 1915 & secondly in France in October, 1918 & was mentioned in Despatches.

Templeux-Le-Guerard British Cemetery

Templeux-le-Guerard is a village 26 kilometres east of Peronne, France and Templeux-le-Guerard British Cemetery is south-east of the village on the road to Haricourt.

The village was taken early in April, 1917, lost on the 21st March, 1918, and retaken by the 15th Suffolks of the 74th (Yeomanry) Division on the following 18th September. Templeux-Le-Guerard British Cemetery was begun by the 59th Division in April, 1917, and carried on by other units until August, 1917, and again in September and October, 1918. It was largely increased after the Armistice by the concentration of graves from the battlefields (of April, 1917, and March and September, 1918) surrounding the village; and in 1930 the British graves from two cemeteries, Gouy British Cemetery & Ste Emilie British Cemetery, Villers-Faucon were brought in.

There are now over 750 World War I casualties commemorated in this site. Of these, nearly a quarter are unidentified and special memorials are erected to 16 soldiers from the United Kingdom, known or believed to be buried among them. The cemetery covers an area of 2509 square metres and is enclosed on three sides by a low rubble wall. (CWGC)

Newspaper Report:

eldest son of Mr and Mrs Penruddocke, of Compton Park, Salisbury. He had relinquished his commission a few months before the war, but immediately on the outbreak he rejoined, and was posted to a battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment, with which he remained until his death. He had spent three winters on the Salonkia front, where he was wounded in November last year, proceeding to another front in the summer of this year with his battalion. He was 25 years of age, and was educated at Clifton and Sherbourne, where he proved himself a good athlete as a runner and also gained his house colours. His colonel writes:- "I need hardly say how much I feel his loss,

as he was one of the best and bravest fellows I know. He was doing extraordinarily good work at the time, and was invaluable to me and the brigade. The battalion have lost a very good friend." Of his two brothers, the younger was killed in action on the Salonika front in April, 1917, while the second and surviving one was wounded at the battle of the Somme and was awarded the M.C.
