Joseph Edwin Cook was born in Laidley, Queensland in 1880 to parents Joseph & Eliza Cook. He was a farmer, single & aged 35 years & 8 months from Thornton, Laidley, Queensland when he enlisted on 29th February, 1916 with the 42nd Infantry Battalion, 2nd Reinforcements of the Australian Army. His Service Number was 1818 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his mother, Mrs Eliza Cook of Thornton, Laidley, Queensland. Joseph's father had died when Joseph was 14 years old & Joseph had remained at home with his mother & sisters until he enlisted.

(The first page of his Attestation Paper has his age typed as 25 years & 8 months, however page 3 has his age handwritten as 35 years & 8 months)

Pte Cook embarked from Brisbane, Queensland on H.M.A.T. *Boorara* (A42) on 16th August, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 13th October, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. These were located in the Salisbury Plain area in the county of Wiltshire.

On 14th November, 1916, Pte Cook was marched into No 3 Command depot. On 17th November he was marched into 3rd Amal. Trg Btn 11th Camp at Hurcott, then marched out on same day to 11th Training Battalion Camp 13 Lark Hill, Durrington, Wiltshire.

Private Cook died of Broncho Pneumonia at Military Hospital at Fovant, Wiltshire at 2 a.m. on 6th December, 1916, aged 36. A death for Joseph E Cook was registered in the September quarter of 1916, in the district of Wilton, Wiltshire. (Fovant was a parish in the district of Wilton).

Pte Cook was buried at Compton Chamberlayne Cemetery, Wiltshire on 8th December, 1916.

Private Joseph Edwin Cook is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 135.






Mrs Cook of Thornton, via Laidley, has received word from the military authorities that her son Private Joseph E. Cook (and nephew of Councillor John Cook of Laidley) died on December 6 of bronchial pneumonia at Lark Hill Camp.

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Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Compton Chamberlayne Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
