

Post Office Directory Extract 1859 Compton Chamberlayne



Compton Chamberlain is a township, parish and village, in South Damerham Hundred, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury and deanery of Chalke, Wilton Union, Salisbury county court district, South Wilts, 6 miles west-by-south from Wilton, 10 from Salisbury and 105 from London.

The church of St Michael is a small ancient Gothic structure, with square tower and 1 bell; the interior contains a tablet to the memory of Colonel John Penruddock, who was beheaded by Cromwell's orders.

The living is a vicarage in the gift of Charles Penruddock, Esq., and held by the Rev. John Ravenshaw Wood. The earliest register bears date in 1538.

The area is 2,130 acres and the population, in 1851, was 352.
