On 29th March 1916 Thomas embarked from Alexandria and disembarked at Marseilles on 6th April 1916

He was admitted to hospital several times between June1916 and December 1916

On 22nd September 1917, Private Cass was wounded in action in Belgium with a gunshot wound to his right shoulder and was transferred back to England a few days later. He was transferred to the Southern General Hospital, Birmingham and later to No. 1 Australian Auxiliary Hospital at Harefield Park, Middlesex and then to No. 4 Command Depot at Hurdcott, Wiltshire.

Thomas was again returned to overseas duty in January 1918 in France after returning from 7 days Absent Without Leave

On 1st June 1918 Private Cass was again wounded in action with a gunshot wound to the back and was transferred back to England

Information from the Matron of the Military Hospital at Fovant, Wiltshire shows that Thomas was admitted to Military Hospital at Fovant on 6th August 1918. He was operated upon suffering from a gunshot wound to his spine. No improvement followed and he gradually became worse until his death. His brother, Lieutenant Cass was with him sometime before he died

Private Thomas Cass died at 11 p.m. on 17th August, 1918, from wounds received in action and cerebro-spinal meningitis at the Military Hospital at Fovant, Wiltshire

He was buried on 19th August 1918. The coffin was good, polished elm with brass mountings. He was buried with full Military Honours, the body being conveyed to the graveside on a gun carriage, preceded by a firing party and band. Six men of the deceased's company acted as pallbearers and a number of officers, N.C.O.'s and men attended as mourners. His brother, Captain F. Cass, of Administrative Headquarters attended as chief mourner. A beautiful wreath from deceased's brother was placed on the grave. Headquarters, A.I.F. Depots in the U.K. were represented at the funeral.

Thomas was awarded 1914/15 Star, Victory Medal & Memorial plaque which were sent to his sister - Mrs. E. Sell, 75 Carr Street, Perth, Western Australia. His British War Medal & clasp and Memorial Scroll were sent to his brother, Mr. . Cass of 7 Wright Street, Adelaide, South Australia, as per agreement between the brother and sister.

Other Significant Information

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Private Cass was described by his family as being of "a humorous vein, highly musical (clarinet) and exceptionally kind in his disposition."

Thomas had a brother, Captain F. Cass who was twice mentioned in despatches and afterwards attached to H.Q. Staff London (Records).
