The Music Quiz





Amazing Art Exhibition

It has been several decades since the last exhibition and this one surpassed all expectations. The work of over 20 village artists was on display, helped greatly by the generous provision of stands leant by Tim Scott Bolton, who also exhibited. A welcome feature of the show was the mix of nationally renowned artists with other amateur local artists. The show was very well attended on both the weekend days, and people came from far and wide. Many visitors showed amazement at the general standard and wonderful mix of techniques; the 'St Ives' of South Wiltshire was suggested! We had stained glass work, sculpture, both professional and amateur, and painting and drawing of many styles. Amongst them were drawings by Ellis Butcher, a local thatcher, who had only started in the last few months, and who sold all he exhibited, as did some other artists, all proceeds going to Hall funds. Generous commissions given by the professional artists also much helped the fund-raising, as did the days of work put in by Nicki Sturrock in providing home-made cakes, tea and coffee and Lizzie Gascoyne for much work behind the scenes. Our village is a very special place.









St Mary's Church

Ash Wednesday was celebrated on 6th March and heralds the start of Lent: this is a period of forty days' reflection prior to the Easter celebration of the risen Christ. The name of Ash Wednesday comes from the ash collected from burning the previous year's palms and is used by the Priest to place the sign of the cross on the foreheads of members of the congregation, as a sign of repentance and contemplation of their transgressions. During this period, Lent courses are run at two venues: Coopers Ground at 2.30pm on each Tuesday from 12th March to 16th April and at the Donhead St Andrew Rectory at 7.00 pm on each Wednesday from 13th March to 17th April. The times and venues of the Lent lunches organised during this period are posted on the Church Notice Board. The start of Holy Week commences with Palm Sunday on 14th April and there will be additional Services held



throughout the Benefice during the week: details are also on the Church Notice Board. However, at St Mary's on the 19th April there will be a Good Friday Liturgy at 2.00 pm, which provides an opportunity for quiet reflection. The Easter Sunday Sung Eucharist on the 21st April will be at 11.00 am – a joyous occasion for the Church at large.

On the 1st March, the Revd June Laine conducted an informal Service for the Womens' World Day of Prayer, which was organised by the women of Slovenia: the theme this year was to highlight the conditions of many women who are adversely affected by exclusion, loneliness, poverty and alcoholic abuse in their homes. It is good to be reminded sometimes of how fortunate we are in our rural community and to be aware of the need to support those who are affected so badly in many countries abroad.

The Annual Parochial Church Council met after the 09.30 Service on Sunday, 17th March and individual reports from the Rector, Treasurer and different sections involved in running the Church were presented and discussed. Our teams of volunteer cleaners do a splendid job on a weekly basis: however an annual spring clean provides a much needed extra dose of "TLC". The date has yet to be decided but hopefully will be before Easter: if you can spare an hour to take part, it would lessen the workload and be much appreciated. In January I recorded rain on 9 different days.

The longest period without rainfall was 11 days.

There were only 3 January's with lower rainfall recorded in the last 25 years.

This January was well below the average of the last 25 years of January's being (96.54mm) 3.80".

In February I recorded rain on 10 different days, which included 10mm of melted snow in my gauge on 1st February; with one period of 16 days without rain.

There were 10 February's with lower rainfall recorded in the last 25 years.

This February was naturally below the average of the last 25 years of February's being (74.47mm) 2.93".

The Met Office report that this February recorded the warmest day since records began, I don't know whether this includes East Knoyle, but it did seem surprisingly warm on a few days.

GARDENING TIPS

from Mrs McGregor

There were times last winter when I thought the garden would never wake up again, but suddenly the days just don't seem long enough for all the jobs that need doing. Everything is sprouting at once - including the weeds.

On my list of jobs both in the flower garden and in the veggie patch this spring:

MARCH:

- □ Sow direct broad beans, peas, carrots, and root veggies that don't mind the cold
- □ Sow leeks, spinach, chard and salad greens indoors
- □ Watch for slugs, especially on soft new growth, and use a nematode control
- □ Chit potatoes in a cool, dry, frost free place (about 50F) eg. a porch or greenhouse
- Plant shallots and onion sets
- Cut old leaves off hellebores
- Deadhead bulbs to improve next year's flowers (no need to tie up the stems and leaves)
- Put plant supports in now so your plants can grow up through them
- Top dress pots and containers with fresh compost
- Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control early

APRIL:

- $\hfill\square$ Repair and overhaul/clean your waterbutt ready for the hot summer ahead
- □ Help your lawn green up by raking out dead moss and then fork over to improve drainage
- □ Apply a lawn fertilizer
- Feed shrubs
- □ Plant out your autumn sown sweet pea seedlings or sow direct in their final flowering position
- Plant up hanging baskets and keep them in the greenhouse while the plants grow on
- Mulch fruit trees with well rotted manure
- Plant potatoes at about a trowel's depth after danger of frost is over
- □ Sow direct winter cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower and salad crops
- □ Start marrows, courgettes, squashes, runner beans, french beans and tomatoes indoors

A question from a Reader:


Q: Dear Mrs McGregor, I entered my roses in the East Knoyle Flower Show last year but the results were rather disappointing – have you any tips to help me improve? Yours, Miss M.

A: Dear Miss M, there are plenty of things you can be doing right now to help improve your roses. In March you should prune back your bush roses by one third to a half. Prune climbing roses at the same time but first take out any dead, diseased or dying branches. Then prune any flowered side shoots back by two thirds. Finally tie in any new shoots needed to fill gaps. If you mulched your roses over the winter, now you can feed them with a specialised rose fertilizer, and continue to do so every three weeks throughout the growing season. Keep an eye out for pests, particularly aphids, which – in a mild spring - may infest young leaves almost as soon as they appear. Finally a word about watering. Roses hate their roots sitting in water, so over-watering can be as bad as allowing your roses to dry out completely. Keep at it and your roses should be blooming marvellous this year!

Having spent forty years sacrificing her own talent and ambition to support him, it is during their trip to Stockholm, where he is to

Glenn Close's performance is laden with subtle suppression of resentment and rage as she is faced with the charade of playing the supportive, adoring wife. Christian Slater is the journalist who makes her confront some uncomfortable realities. Glenn Close's real-life daughter, Annie Stark, plays the young Joan.

Our **April** screening on **Wednesday 24th** is a little bit 'edgy' as they say. **The More You Ignore Me (15)** is based on Jo Brand's novel and is a comedy drama focusing on an unconventional family in 1980s rural England. Hindon Surgery News



Test Results

In Hindon we do several thousand tests every year to investigate and monitor your illnesses. Hospitals will also be doing lots of tests. We need your help to ensure all this testing is done safely which means you need to

be involved in the process. Please don't assume that if a test has been done someone will contact you with the result and if you hear nothing it will be normal.

Results generally take about 2 days to come back from the hospital. Please make sure you either book a follow up appointment when you book the test or, if no appointment is needed, make sure you call the surgery to check on the result. Our staff will only give you test results and instructions from the GP, once they have seen the result and filed it into your notes.

If there is an abnormality the GP will check to see if you have made an appointment and will ask a receptionist to call anyone not about to be seen to advise of a prescription that may be needed. This is a safety net in case you haven't already been in touch, but we would hope you would initiate the contact.

If you have a test requested by a hospital clinician, they will not copy the result to the GP. The clinician ordering the test is clinically responsible for informing the patient of the result and should be competent to interpret the test – many of those done in hospitals cannot be safely interpreted by your GP even if we were sent them. If they tell you to "ask your GP", challenge them. It is their duty to inform you themselves.

Other ways you can help us with your care include ringing us soon after you have been discharged from hospital to let us know how you are getting on, and keeping an eye on your prescription repeats if you have a long term condition to book your reviews with a nurse or GP.

Many thanks for helping us to provide you with safe and effective care.

Easter Egg Treasure Hunt



Knoyle Knature Notes from The Yaffle

The first blossom you're likely to have seen in hedgerows is that of the Myrabalan or Cherry plum, with its delicate small white flowers. This native of the Balkans was introduced into hedging, but there is also a red-leaved variety with a pink blossom that you'll find in gardens . All varieties bear small red or yellow fruits which make delicious compote, jam or chutney. The Blackthorn or Sloe bear early flowers ahead of their leaves too; there's a magnificent stand on Le Neuborg Way in Gillingham which were already in flower in mid -February. The Goat or 'pussy willow' with its yellowish pollen and nectar laden catkins are out too, though mis-timed seasonal hedge cutting foreshortens the important role this plant plays in our all - important hedgerows.



The early warm spell brought out a large hatch of Brimstone butterflies, their lilting, citrine flight adding a colourful zest to the spring backdrop of Celandines, Primroses and early Daffodils.

The Upper Greensand strata of the Parish, with its local stone buildings, walls and generous covering of natural woodland, provide the perfect habitat for mosses, lichens and fungi. Lichens are not a single organism, but a mutually beneficial and stable association between a fungus and an algae and/or cyanobacteria. Lichen requires carbon as a food source, which is provided by the algae or cyanobacteria, which are photosynthetic. Lichen colonies may live for thousands of years. There are estimated to be 1,700 species in the UK. The Oakmoss or Stag lichen with its 'oriental' fragrance was used in 16th Century perfumery. It was also used as a fixative base and, with its acid extracts, was used to treat external wounds and infections. Baskets of Oakmoss were found in ancient Egyptian tombs as a part of the goods to be taken on into the afterlife.

Following the dawn chorus on milder mornings, you'll hear the territorial signature drumming of woodpeckers, through which females can read much of a male bird's prowess. Whilst mainly nocturnal, Tawny owls are vociferous throughout the day at this time of year as they conduct sitting and feeding changes on the nest. There have been particularly large flocks of Chaffinches evident in our woodlands over the winter, if you were lucky you might have spotted the odd Brambling amongst them.

Living as we do in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, the dramatic and worrying decline of all insect species worldwide is perhaps not obvious to us. Leaving a 'wild' area in your garden, however small, will provide a breeding haven for our local insects.
