Despite the lingering grey skies, the celebration of our Easter Sung Eucharist was a joyous occasion, enhanced by attractive floral arrangements which were enjoyed by the many villagers and visiting friends and relatives who also attended: on a personal note - now that Lent has passed, at last my fancy for a bite or two of chocolate is permitted once again!

Snow intervened for our planned Annual Parochial Church Council Meeting which was cancelled and had to be re-scheduled for Tuesday 24th April at 6.00 pm in the Village Hall. Very unusually we also found it necessary to cancel Services on two Sundays – due to "The Beast from the East". During these conditions, parishioners kept an eye out for those needing a helping hand, clearing paths or collecting shopping: however some of the young had a splendid time sledging or building snowmen before the white stuff disappeared!

Please note that there are one or two "different" Services in our Benefice during the April/May period. On the 29th April we will meet at 9.00 am at St Catherine's Sedgehill for a three-mile walk to "Beat the Bounds", prior to the Rogation Service at 9.30 in the Church: dogs and children are especially welcome! On Sunday, 13th May everyone is invited to meet at Win Green at 11.00 am for an open air Ascension Day Service: do take a picnic lunch to enjoy in the lovely surroundings afterwards.

The Archdeacon of Sarum has circulated news of a significant theft of lead from a Church in Salisbury. He recommends that friends and neighbours of our Church should be vigilant and report anything suspicious to the Police.

Our Fundraising Programme is on course and we continue to raise awareness that the future of our beautiful Church requires our support. Good news! Our Fete is to be held at Knoyle House Ground and playing field on Saturday 1st September, and the planning is well under way. Another date for your diary is a Village Wine Tasting on Saturday 9th June: this will be held in the Village Hall and ticket holders will be able to sample wines from around the world and enjoy a light lunch after the Tasting: tickets will be on sale as usual in our splendid Community Shop.

Our present Churchwarden, Michael Butler, will be retiring at the APCC Meeting: we all thank him immensely for devoting so much time and energy to our Church over a considerable number of years, with enormous help from his wife, Jill. St Mary's cannot run without guidance and his commitment has been unstinting in overseeing the affairs of the Church and giving much needed support for our Rector, Richard.

Parish Council News

The Parish Council were fortunate to have our Wiltshire County Councillor, Bridget Wayman attend the Parish Assembly held on 10th April. Bridget is a regular PC meeting attender. Following frequent PC protestations over the condition of roads around the village it seems we may be on the verge of some action. Wise Lane, in particular the section that runs through the Green and past the Fox and Hounds appears to have moved up the list of priorities, andwe hope to see some improvements quite soon.

The SIDS (speed indicator device) feasibility meeting held on the 24th March was poorly attended. The purpose of the meeting was to assess if there was a ground swell of opinion, to be matched with volunteer numbers, strong enough to assemble a team to operate the system. At this point in time the PC will not proceed with this idea any further. One thing to come out of the meeting however, was the need to reduce speed limits in some parts of the village to 30mph where they are currently 60mph. The PC will be putting together a working party to look into how we can achieve this and if you would like to be a part of this, contact the Clerk. The more the merrier!!

The PC appointed Mark Howell and Phil Buttress to look after the cutting of grass and maintenance of KHG playground at the meeting on the 10th April. WCC will cut verges as late as they can and will be responsible for keeping junctions safe when the growing season is in full swing.

The East Knoyle 1918 Trail

The story so far.....

The starting point for the trail is the names on our war memorial. Building on the excellent work of Tony Claydon, Dawn Small and the late Jan Oliver, we know the servicemen's rank; parents, brothers and sisters, where they were born and are buried.

Following our appeal in the last newsletter, the Joliffe family have kindly come forward with documents and a photograph of the house where the three brothers, all killed in action, lived. This is just the kind of material and help we are looking for.

The team are trawling the archives, the Internet and reading maps of, and books about, East Knoyle. We need those stories handed down through the generations and any information that could confirm or build upon facts

we already have. Mostly we just have one word as a clue of an address: Milton, Upton, or Holloway. Now we need to find the exact house.

Is your house built prior to 1918? Do you have any old letters or documents that will help us fill in the gaps. Your family photographs will probably reveal more than you think. Everything you have will be of great interest to us. Please be assured that all material will be copied and safely returned to you. This is a sustainable project as it is the intention that all material, subject to the owner's permission, will eventually form part of a digitised village archive ensuring that it will be readily available for generations to follow.

Already our attention is turning to the people who served in the armed services and thankfully returned. Their records and the details of their post war life are more difficult to find.

Before the war the population here numbered 853. After 1918 this had been reduced to 650. Where did those people go? Most 'East Knoylers' were agricultural workers employed by the big estates that had to be sold off, either to meet death duties or through the lack of a generation to run them. So probably there was less work for the men to return to. Perhaps the men gained new skills and moved on. We would like to know.

Technology had moved on. Our farmer's 'horsepower' used to mean, well, real horses that used to be a huge part of everyday working life here. The loss of horses to the battlefield and introduction of tractors altered country life forever.

There are so many elements we wish to cover. So far we have made no mention of the women of East Knoyle. It would be very interesting to hear about the brave souls who waved their husbands and sons goodbye and just carried on. Were there any farms here in the hands of women farmers, perhaps with the help of the Land Army? We know women did more than knit socks and write letters to their loved ones. Despite yet to be granted the right to vote the country relied on them to play their part. So, it's time to ask, "What did great grandmother do in the war?"

Knoyle Knature Notes

The Parish litter pick in March was responsible for discovering the Scarlet Elf Cup Mushroom (see photo). On first catching sight of some vivid colour amongst the undergrowth off the margin on Wise Lane, I went to pick up what I took to be some sweet wrappings. With malevolant thoughts of what I'd like to do to the person who discarded them, on



getting closer I thought, no they're Camellia petals, before seeing that they were exquisitely formed mushrooms growing on dead wood amongst the leaf litter. These edible mushrooms are one of the few to appear in the colder months They apparently make an audible puffing sound when they release their spores.



There's much excitement as the world's heaviest flying bird makes a return to SW England. Symbolised on the Wiltshire County flag, The Great Bustard had been hunted to extinction in the county by the 1830's. Now, thanks to the perseverance of David Waters, The Great Bustard Group is presiding over an increasingly successful programme to re-establish a sustainable native breeding population, principally in the South West, but also in other parts of its former breeding range. See www.greatbustard.org

Another species extinction is being addressed by Southampton University, who are undertaking a project to re-establish the most beautifully marked but climate sensitive butterfly, the Black veined white. Warmer days have brought us the first hatches of the sulphur yellow Brimstone and Small tortoiseshell, with overwintered Red Admirals and Peacocks appearing from hibernation. Keep your eyes open for moths, two of our most vividly coloured varieties, the Jersey Tiger and the Scarlet Tiger are both day flyers and may be seen amongst garden flowers from May.

The ongoing decline of of the wild bee population continues to be a concern, with the use of neonicotinoid pesticides generally quoted as a major cause, along with disease and loss of habitat. DEFRA has both a huge opportunity and equally obligation in its formation of a new and 'fit for purpose' agricultural policy for Britain post 2019. This must recognise the vital importance of our farmers as the principal stewards of so much our landscape. Policies are required that encourage and incentivise the cultivation of sustainably diversified crops, within an environmental framework that re-establishes the corridors of connectivity so vital to the survival and proliferation of species within the diverse beauty of our countryside.



East Knoyle Rainfall

Rainfall recorded March 129 mm (5.08")

What a March, we started with snow, then rain, then snow again in the middle and then more rain. I recorded rainfall on 21 days and there was only one spell of three days and one spell of two days plus four single days without rain. The 5.08" (129 mm) of rain recorded was well above the March average of the last 24 years of 3.30" (83.82mm), indeed it was the wettest March by far in the last 24 years. 2008 was the wettest March by far until now at 4.53".

Writing this now (on 15 April) obviously Aprils' figures won't be available until the next Edition, but so far April has been quite spectacular for rain as well.

Well that's the rainfall.

Can I make a plea to all you readers. Please all of you look deep into your hearts to see if one or some of you can take take over the Editorship of this Newsletter. Easter Treasure Hunt

The organisers of the Treasure hunt had been worried about the last minute change of venue from Clouds Lodge to Village Hall. Volunteers and the community spirit

Whilst most of our patients help us by their active involvement in their health care as resourceful patients, many of you also help the surgery and the community by volunteering, and we would like to thank all of you for this fantastic work. We would also encourage far more people to think about what they could do, especially as one of the few things shown to improve health and longevity is voluntary work.

We run a prescription request drop-off and dispensed medicines pick-up service from East Knoyle shop two days a week and the transport is done by two very dedicated volunteers with a willing deputy. They cannot go on supporting their community forever and we would welcome more volunteers so this service can continue to the benefit of all our patients living in East Knoyle.

We also have marvellous help from our patient representative group (PRG) with over a hundred virtual members, and around twenty who contribute to our annual meetings. This year we hope to build a new surgery to provide care to the patients of Hindon and the surrounding villages for the next fifty years. We need the help of younger and working patients (that's anyone under 75!) – you are the people who will most benefit from this and you can influence what will happen by joining the PRG. (If you want to join, just let reception know and check that your email details are up-to-date).

The snow showed just what a fantastic community we live in with volunteers clearing the snow, calling on the elderly living alone, offering to drop off prescriptions or supplies or get staff into work. We were struck by two things – how well it worked but also how few younger people were involved. We know the pressures on working patients but if you are interested in lifestyle that promotes your own good health as well as the usual not smoking, taking regular exercise, eating and drinking sensibly and being ideal body weight – please think about volunteering to do something, however small, to help your local community. It will be good for the community but very good for you.


