Kellys Directory Extract 1867 **Great Bedwyn**

GREAT BEDWYN is a large village, parish, and ancient borough, and polling place for the Southern division of the county, in Kinwardstone hundred, Hungerford union county court district, diocese of Salisbury, archdeaconry of Wilts, and rural deanery of Marlborough, completely surrounded by forest and woodland, situated 7 miles south-east from Marlborough, 5 south-west from Hungerford, and 66 from London. The church of St. Mary is of Late Norman architecture, and consists of nave, north and south transepts, chancel, and tower containing 6 bells and cock: it was restored in 1854, at the cost of the Marquis of Ailesbury and parishioners: in the south transept is an ancient monument, in a recumbent posture: there is a stained glass window, in memory of Sir Thomas Fellows, Knt.; in the chancel is a fine monument to Sir Joh Seymour, father of Lady Jane Seymour. The register dates from 1538. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £212, in the patronage of the Marquis of Ailesbury, and held by the Rev. John Dryden Hodgson, M.A., of St. Peter's College, Cambridge. There is a National school, which has an endowment of £8 per annum from Cox's charity; there is also a small charity of £10 per annum for apprenticing boys born within the limits of the borough. Wolf Hall, the ancient residence of the Seymour family, is 2 miles south-west. There is a pleasure fair held on the 26th and27th of July. The Kennet and Avon Canal runs through the north-east part of the parish. The tithings of CROFTON, MARTEN, WEXCOMBE, East and West Grafton and Wilton are included in this parish. Savernake House, the seat of the Marquis of Ailesbury, is in the locality, surrounded by the forest and plantations extending for many miles, abounding with deer and game. The Berks and Hants Extension Railway has a station here. The Wansdyke passes through the parish. The marquis of Ailesbury is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is clayy; subsoil chalk and green sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley, &c. The area is 10,420 acres, and the population in 1861 was 2,263.

EAST and WEST GRAFTON are hamlets in this parish but forming a separate ecclesiastical parish, distant 8 miles south-east from Marlborough, 8 south-west from Hungerford station, and 69 from London. A very neat district church (St. Nicholas), in the Norman style of architecture, has lately been erected in East Grafton, the site and endowment of which was given by the Marquis of Ailesbury. The living is a perpetual curacy, annual value of £60, in the aift of the vicar of Great Bedwyn, and held by the Rev. G. Stallard, M.A., of St. John's College, Cambridge.
