CHIPPENHAM TURNPIKE ROADS

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Trustees of the Turnpike Roads under an Act passed in the 58th year of the reign of King George the Third, intituled "An Act for more effectually repairing and improving the road leading from Studley Bridge through the borough of Chippenham, to Pickwick, and from the east end of Chippenham Bridge to Lower Stanton, and from the east end of the said Bridge to join the road at Draycot Cerne, in the county of Wilts," will meet at the New Hall, in Chippenham, Tuesday the 8th of September next, at 12 o'clock at noon, for the purpose of ORDERING and DIRECTING that a TOLL GATE be ERECTED and placed upon and across the Turnpike Road leading from Chippenham to Malmesbury, at the top of Yewstocks Hill, in the parish of Hardenhuish; And also that another TOLL GATE or BAR, be ERECTED and placed on the side of the said Turnpike Road, in the said parish of Hardenhuish, across a certain highway called Greenway Lane, leading from the said Turnpike Road to Langley Burrell. And also at the same meeting to Order and Direct that the present Toll Gate across the said Turnpike Road at the Little George be TAKEN DOWN and discontinued.
