Little Langford

LITTLE LANGFORD is a village and parish, 2 miles north-west from Wishford station on the Great Western railway, 9 north-west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Branch and Dole, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Wilton union, Salisbury county court district, rural deanery of Wylde and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese. The church of St. Nicolas is a small cruciform building of flint and stone, in the Norman, Early English and Decorated styles, rebuilt, after the model of the ancient edifice, in 1864, consisting of chancel, south chantry chapel and nave, south porch and a central turret containing one bell, and will seat about 70 persons. The register dates from the year 1699. The living is a rectory, gross yearly value £127, including 7 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Earl of Pembroke J.P. and held since 1882 by the Rev. Albert Edward Baynham, M.A. of St. Mary Hall, Oxford. The Earl of Pembroke J.P. is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is light loam; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley. The area is 958 acres; rateable value, £1,013; the population in 1881 was 82.

Letters through Heytesbury, via Bath, arrive at 9 a.m. The nearest money order & telegraph offices are at Wilton & Codford.

GROVELEY WOOD, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish, 1½ miles north-west, where a small school-chapel has been erected (1867) by the Earl of Pembroke, who is the chief landowner. In the neighbourhood are some ancient entrenchments. The area is 958 acres; rateable value, £672; the population in 1881 was 48.
