

Typical Inclosure System

Ludgershall Inclosure Map Notice 1851

I, FRANCIS ATTWOOD, of the Close, of the city of New Sarum, in the County of Wilts, the Valuer acting in the matter of the INCLOSURE of the COMMON called "SPRAY LEAZE AND NO MAN'S BALL" situate in the parish of Ludgershall in the county of Wilts, hereby give Notice that the Road or Roads, Track or Tracks across the Common called "Spray Leaze" commencing at or somewhere near to the South West Corner of the said Common adjoining the Turnpike Road from Ludgershall to adjoining the Turnpike Road from Ludgershall to Andover, and proceeding thence across the said Common to Crawlboys Lane End Gate, is intended to be STOPPED UP and DISCONTINUED from and after the TWENTY-FIFTH day of MARCH next.

AND IN LIEU THEREOF, I do hereby give notice that I have set out and appointed one Public Carriage Road and Highway through and over certain old inclosed Lands in the said Parish, of the width of Twenty-four Feet, commencing at the North West Corner of "Town Field" and proceeding thence Eastwardly in the direction of the Biddesden Foot Path for the distance of about twelve Chains, and thence turning North Eastwardly in the direction of the Chute Foot Path on the Southward Boundary of a certain old Inclosure called "Long Park and Crow Bush Piece," whence it continues in a straight line across the said old Inclosure until it falls into Collingbourne Green Drove leading to Crawlboys Lane End Gate.

AND I DO HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, that I have caused the said intended Public Road to be staked and marked out, and have prepared a Map on which the same is accurately laid down and described, which Map is signed by me and deposited at the Queen's Head Inn, in the said Parish of Ludgershall, for the inspection of all Persons concerned, and a copy of the same Map is also lying at my office, in the Close, of the city of New Sarum aforesaid.
