## Lydiard Millicent


#### Abstract

LYDIARD MILLICENT is a village and parish, a mile south of Purton, on the Swindon and Gloucester branch of the Great Western railway, 3 north-west from Wooton Bassett, 6 south from Cricklade and 5 west by north from Swindon, in the Northern division of the county, Highworth hundred, Cricklade \& Wootton Bassett petty sessional division and union, Swindon county court district, Cricklade rural deanery, North Wilts archdeaconry and diocese of Bristol. The church of All Saints is an edifice in the Later English style, consisting of chancel, nave of six bays, south aisle, south porch, and a western tower, with pinnacles, containing 5 bells, which were re-hung and re-cast in 1906. The nave was built in the reign of Henry VI; the aisle, of a later date, is supposed to have been built by a family of the name of Russell, under a license granted by the king to the de Clintons, who were then lords of the manor; in the church is a Norman font, and there are remains of a Norman stump[?) and of Lancet windows: the church was thoroughly repaired and re-pewed in 1841, 1842 and 1870, and has 250 sittings: in the churchyard is an ancient stone cross, with a modern top. The register dates from the year 1580. The living is a rectory, net yearly value $£ 346$, including 35 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Pembroke College, Oxford, and held since 1905 by the Rev David Percy Harrison MA of that college. There is a Primitive Methodist chapel here and one at SHAW. The Cricklade and Wootton Bassett Isolation Hospital, situated in this parish, was erected in 1892, at a cost of $£ 180$ including furnishing, and has 12 beds. Cleoburey's charity, of $£ 100$, left by the Rev Christopher Cleoburey, former rector of this parish, is given on St Thomas' Day to the poor of the parish. Edmund Story-Maskelyne esq is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Viscountess Bolingbroke, Edmund Story-Maskelyne esq, James H Sadler esq JP, and Henry Longley esq The soil is oolite brash, with deep clay on the lower grounds, as in the Braydon district; sub-soil clay. The land is chiefly in pasture. The area is 2333 acres of land and 5 of water, rateable value $£ 4607$; the population in 1911 was 807.


Post Office; Miss Charlotte Smith, sub-postmistress. Letters arrive from Swindon and are delivered at $7.35 \mathrm{am} \& 3.10 \mathrm{pm}$; dispatched at 7.35 am and 6.55 pm , Sundays at 9 am . Purton, 1.5 miles distant, is the nearest money order and telegraph office. The post office closes at 1 pm on Wednesday. Wall Letter Boxes: The Green, cleared at 6.45 pm weekdays only, and Greatfield cleared at $10 \mathrm{am} \& 7.25 \mathrm{pm}$, Sundays at 9.45 am ; Shaw, cleared at 7.15 pm , Sundays at 9.40 am .

Elementary School (boys \& girls), with residence for master; built in 1864, on a site given by the late Rev Henry T Streeton, for 130 children, and enlarged in 1886 by an additional classroom to hold 130; Henry Evans, master.
