

Post Office Directory Extract 1859 Milton Lilbourne



Milton Lilbourne is a parish in the hundred of Kinwardstone, union of Pewsey, and Marlborough county court district; it comprises three tithings, viz., Milton, Fyfield and Clench, 2 miles east from Pewsey, 14 miles east from Devizes, and 7 south from Marlborough, diocese of Salisbury, archdeaconry of Wilts, and deanery of Marlborough. The living is a vicarage, annual value £111: the Rev. John Henry Gale is the incumbent. The church, a very ancient structure, with square tower and 6 bells, is supposed to have been erected about the 10th century. The Kennet and Avon canal passes through the northern portion of the parish. The area is 3,502 acres, and the population in 1851 was 677. The Marquis of Ailesbury is the principal landowner and lord of the manor.

Fyfield, or Fifield Manor House, the residence of the Penruddocke family for several generations, is in the Elizabethan style and well worthy the survey of the antiquarian.

Clinch, or Clench, is a tithing 2 miles north; Totridge, three-quarters of a mile north.
