1875, May 12 School visited and examined by the Rev. S. J. G. Fraser. H.M. Inspector of Schools

**1875, July 1** Report received - "The children are very well behaved and in admirable order, and have passed a very satisfactory examination. The third standard was weak today in both spelling and arithmetic. Rather more neatness is working the sums would be an improvement."

**1875, October 29** Report received - "In consequence of unusually wet weather, the attendance on the day of my visit was much reduced. The staff employed (a mistress, four pupil teachers, and four monitresses), being unusually strong, all the classes were thoroughly looked after. The written work among the younger children was remarkably good, but they were not so well acquainted with the gospel narrative as with the Old Testament facts. The general religious knowledge of the upper class was, considering the age of the children excellent. Discipline and order were unexceptionable."

**1875, December 10** Matilda Billett, teacher since November 21, 1871, leaves the school.

Frank Brokenbrow gained after competition a free scholarship at Colston's Hospital, Stapleton, Bristol.

**1876, May 17** The school visited and examined by the Rev. S. J. G. Fraser, H.M. Inspector of schools.

1876, May 17 Kate Dawson, born June 2, 1863, engaged as teacher, leaving October, 1882

**1876, June 8** The report received ---- "The school is in very good order, and has a very good supply of teachers. In some parts, however, the instruction has not been successful. The spelling of the second standard, and the reading and sums of the fifth standard were good. The reading of the fifth and sixth, repetition of the fifth and sixth, spelling of the second and fifth, sums of the first, second and fourth, and, the botany of the fifth and ex-standard sixth were all fairly good. Reading of the second and fourth standards, sums of the sixth and spelling of the third, were fair. The rest of the work of the standards was inferior, especially the spelling of the fourth standard, composition of the sixth, sums of the third, and botany of the fourth and sixth standards. Grammar, history and geography were on the whole satisfactory."

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**1876, August 10** School visited and examined in religious knowledge by Rev. C. H. Awdry, Diocesan Inspector.

**1876, August 14** Report received "These children are in admirable order, under a strong and efficient staff of teachers. The results of my examination were very creditable, and the paper work of some of the highest group unusually good. I was glad to observe also general accuracy in writing in the groups below the highest."

**1876, November 6** E. Newman, who had served as pupil teacher at Stratton St. Margaret's engaged as teacher.

**1876, November 22** E. Newman approved by the Council of Education as assistant mistress.

**1877, May 16** The school visited and examined by H. M. Inspector.

**1877, June 15** Report received "The discipline of the school is very good, and the children have passed a greatly improved examination. The fifth standard was very weak in reading; the rest of the work was fairly well done more than half of the children passed in the three elementary subjects, and more than a quarter of them passed in two subjects.

1877, June 29 G. Dawson gained a free scholarship to Colston's School, Bristol.

**1878, February 22** E. Newman, assistant mistress since November 7, 1876, left to take charge of the Infants' school at Marshfield, having received a certificate in the third division.

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1878, March 8 Mercy Bennett, leaves the school.. She entered November 4, 1872, as Mercy Kidd.

1878, May 9 School inspected

**1878, July 5** Report received "The discipline of the school is very good, and there is a full and efficient teaching staff. Care should be taken les the children should learn to lean too much on their teachers and thereby acquire too much dependence of thought. This tendency seems to shew itself in the general average of passes as well as the average of each subject having fallen off slightly since last year. Class subjects fairly satisfactory."

**1878, June 22** Dawson, A. E., Farmilo, M. A., and Sidwell A. E. attend the examination of pupil teachers in religious knowledge and pass in it.

**1878, October 23** School visited and examined in religious knowledge by the Rev. C. S. Taylor, Diocesan Inspector.

**1878, November 6** Report received "The discipline and tone of the school are very good. The children have been carefully taught. They seem to be thoroughly interested in their work, and passed a good examination."

**1879** The schoolhouse was raised a storey at an expense of £100

1879, May 7 School inspected by H. M. Inspector.

**1879, June 11** Report received -- "The general efficiency of the school is fairly commensurate with the amount of labour bestowed upon it. Some of the standard work was very well done, and the girls seem to have been taught needlework very thoroughly. History and grammar have also been handled with very fair success, though the geography was only pretty fair. The results in mathematics and domestic economy were poor; only three passes being secured out of a possible fourteen."

1879, September 12 Ann Coles ceased to be a teacher. She began June 10, 1872

**1879, October 12** M. E. Drewett, teacher since June 18, 1873, leaves the school.

The school year closes April 30, instead of May 31.

**1880, January 2** A. E. Sidwell, assistant mistress, enters the Home and Colonial training college, Gragsinn Road, London

1880, May 13 School visited and examined by the Rev. S. J. G. Fraser and Mr. H. R. Mines.

**1880, June 24** Report received "The school is in very good order, and has made further good advance in the elementary subjects. The second standard did their work very well, especially their spelling. The arithmetic of the first standard too was good on the whole. The rest of this work was good on the whole. Grammar good in the second standard, fair in the third and very good in the fourth, fifth and sixth standards. Geography pretty fair, history fairly good, needlework pretty fair, English repetition fairly good, domestic economy imperfect. The elder infants passed well in sums and very well in writing, but are very backward in reading."

**1880, August 12** School visited and examined in religious knowledge by the Rev. C. H. Awdry, the Diocesan Inspector.

Report:- "The general knowledge of Holy Scripture displayed by the elder children is creditable in a high degree, and the method observable in their paper work is far beyond what is usually met with in a country school. Their knowledge of the first part of the Catechism was a little weak. The younger children also answered well, though their repetition of the Catechism was somewhat indistinct. I would suggest for younger classes the learning of texts and hymns, and some private prayers for all."
