

Post Office Directory Extract 1875 Nunton with Bodenham



NUNTON with BODENHAM forms a parish, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Downton, Alderbury union, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Wilton, distant 3 miles south-east-by-south from Salisbury, and 87 from London. The river Chalk here falls into the Avon. The church (name unknown) is of the Early Decorated style; it was almost wholly rebuilt in 1855, and has chancel, nave, and south aisle, with low square embattled tower and 3 bells. The register dates from the year 1620. The living is a vicarage, annexed to the vicarage of Downton, joint yearly value £80, in the gift of Winchester College, and held by the Rev. Richard Payne, B.C.L of New College, Oxford; the Rev. Richard Phillips is the curate in charge. Here is a small National school, and a place of worship for Baptists. New Hall, in this parish, is the seat of Alfred Buckley, esq., J.P. The Earl of Radnor, who is lord of the manor: and Alfred Buckley, esq., are the principal landowners. The soil is gravel and chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley and hay. The area is included with the parish of Downton; rateable value, £1,595; the population in 1871 was 323.
