SEEND AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

At our March meeting Kate Crowe was asked to talk to the club on "Living Churchyards". This was as a result of a field trip with WEA to churches in the area, where there were leaflets on Church and Churchyard conservation projects. Such projects involved many organisations concerned with lichens, geology, wild flowers, bats etc. It therefore seemed a good idea to find a speaker who could help us find out more about our own churchyard; what it had that was worth preserving and what could be done to improve it.

In the 1980s, Eve Denis of English Nature, did a survey of church lands, many of which had been sacred areas since pre-Christian times. It was recognised that these areas, though not vast, had great conservation value. Cuttings were taken from ancient yews and planted in churchyards which had none before.

Churchyards before the First World War were grazed by goats and sheep, so that fines grasses and meadow flowers survived and were a good source of flower seed. Subsequently churchyards varied from the over-tidy to the overgrown. Today, apart from the need for clear paths for congregations, many have the potential space for a wild flower patch or meadow, with a mown path to enjoy the flowers, or a shady patch for ferns, mosses, lichens and even a damp place for fritillaries. These encourage and make a highway for insects, small animals and birds. Once seed is set, the grass can be cut for hay for pets or other uses.

It was suggested that ivy should be cut back, rather than pulled off, which can do expensive damage to old stonework. Ivy that is left will provide protection for small creatures. A wood pile makes a good home for frogs, toads and insects.

Anyone interested can see what has already been achieved at Bromham, West Ashton, Sandy Lane and Stanton St Quinton churchyards. Help can be found from Wiltshire Wildlife in conjunction with 'Wildlife in Church and Churchyards'.

If you are interested in finding out more information, there is a seminar at Ramsbury Church Hall entitled "Caring for God's Acre" on Saturday 6th May from 9.45am to 4.00pm.

There will be a visit to Enfield House, 62 Yard Lane, Netherstreet, Bromham on the evening of 24th May at 6.30pm. Contact Monica Ridgeway (828472) stating if

you would like a lift or if you have spare seats in your car. Please say if you would like to have a meal afterwards at the "Oliver Cromwell" pub. Thank you.

Chairman's Report – Annual Parish Council Meeting 5th April 2006

Turpin Stone – The Dick Turpin Stone situated near Brass Pan Bridge was refurbished last year but sadly soon after being replaced was vandalised and badly defaced. The culprits have never been identified.

Bulkington Village Signs

You may have noticed these signs are now surrounded by beautiful daffodils and we must thank Mr Tony Bradford for planting these bulbs.

Planning Applications

Several applications have been received by the Parish Council this year, one of which is a proposal by Mr G Elliott to construct 25 mixed houses in a field next to the Playing Field. However, there have been some objections to this plan and it is still the subject of an appeal.

New County Councillors

Ms Julie Swabey (Con) won the local seat from Trevor Corbine (Lib Dem) who served Bulkington well during his tenure. Ms Swabey is unable to attend all parish council meetings as dates clash with her other commitments but she keeps in touch with our Clerk and is well aware of what is happening in the village and I'm sure will serve us very well. She is very keen to set up a Cooperative Mini Bus Scheme with 3 or 4 other parishes and this is still under discussion.

Spotlight – Bulkington Parish Council continues to support Spotlight magazine and a donation of £25 from the Parish Council and £25 from the Playing Field Committee is made annually. A brief summary of Parish Council meetings will be published in the magazine in the future.

Roadside Weeds

The roadside pavement and gutter weeds have made the village appear very untidy in the past. Councillors Nev Boulton and Mark Barnett have sprayed and killed the weeds, which were then removed by Highways, greatly improving the appearance of the village. We must keep our roads and paths clear in the future.

Playing Field

We are currently in discussion with the WWDC concerning exactly which activities are permitted on the Playing Field, as we are currently trying to overcome a ban on team games imposed when the playing field was first opened, thus seriously reducing the pleasure of having a playing field and what activities can and cannot take place on it. The Wessex Water Board has also given us permission to use the loo at the side of the pumping station adjacent to the playing field. A change of lock is all that is required and is being arranged. The keys will be held by the Tipsy Toad, plus 2 others – to be identified. A request has been made for extra parking spaces in front of the playing field to prevent congestion on the road and this is in hand.

The Summer Fete

This is being held on the playing field on 1st July. There will be a full programme of activities and events. It is hoped the Fete will be well attended and all proceeds are being donated to the Church which is in need of renovation and funds.

Village Website

The current website has been redesigned by Cllr Mark Barnett and now has a connection with the Trowbridge web. In so doing, Cllr Boulton discovered that Trowbridge had a Grants Officer, Lorna Gibson, and she has succeeded in obtaining a grant of approx £4,500 for the Village Hall.

Thatched Cottage

It was sad to see the only thatched cottage in Bulkington burn down last year. The property has been made watertight and secure and we understand the property will be re-thatched and re-built to its original specification in the summer.

War Memorial

The last Remembrance Day Service was well attended. Cllr Elliott has suggested we rotate the war memorial, or even just the plaque, to prevent people attending the service from blocking the road as at the last service. Several drivers were reluctant to slow down and a nasty accident could have occurred.

Village Hall

As you will have noticed the village hall has undergone extensive refurbishment in the last few years. The next plan is to install a window in the south wall and to lower the ceiling. Planning permission has been granted.
