

VILLAGE NEWS

<u>Dear fellow villagers of Seend - a message from the Trustees and members of the Seend W. I.</u>

We are required by law to follow the instructions of the Charity Commissioners who have told us that we must seek the highest price for the sale of our land. You, of course, have the right to object to any application for planning permission.

Our business has been conducted entirely through our Solicitor. The wishes of Squire Bell, as stated in the Trust Deed of 1921, have been followed but, as the W. I. is continuing and not closing down, there is an addition - called "A scheme" - which has been approved by the Charity Commissioners who have authorised the sale of the Hall and the land. We have not altered the original Trust Deed in any way, only added to it. **The** original Deed still stands until the Seend W. I. closes. Under the terms of the Trust Deed and Scheme the Seend W. I. are entitled to apply the sale proceeds of the W. I. Hall and land (if any!) 'For the general purposes of the Seend W. I.'. Thus any funds not immediately required for current expenses should be invested and used for paying rent and other expenses unless the Institute decides to purchase alternative premises. It is only if the Institute has surplus funds which it does not require or, if the Institute is suspended or finally closed down, that the Trust Deed permits funds to be used for other purposes for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Seend and an application to the Charity Commissioners would have to be made as to what the funds may be used for. We have had no option but to follow the instructions and advice from the Charity Commissioners and our Solicitor.

We want to live in harmony with our fellow villagers. We are a friendly group and would welcome more ladies in the village to come and join us at Seend School every second Wednesday in the month.

Closure of Bulkington Village Hall

reduced to fire cover and we will not be able to use the hall. This will mean that our hall will not be available for the Parish Council meetings, Elections next May, Ladies Group and Ladies Exercise Classes etc. The present Officers and committee have worked very hard to restore your hall and apart from a couple of small paint jobs (which are in hand) - restoration is now complete.

The date of the December committee meeting will be Monday 4th December 2006 (7:30 PM) and I would be more than delighted to welcome potential active Committee Members who would be willing to serve as Hon. Treasurer and Chair Person.



From Where I Stand...

... gossip is a dangerous thing! Chinese whispers? Well, doubtless we've all been in situations where the original story has developed, over time and by various retellings, into something quite different. It may sometimes even be *so* different that the people involved can get hurt as things are said about them that are either untrue or have become twisted through misunderstanding.

A few days ago a friend, with children getting ready for the October half-term, told me an Autumn story about gossip and the way in which it can not only hurt but cause a great deal of misunderstanding in a community. Three children, at the end of a mixed boys and girls Scout meeting, were being taken

home by the parents of one of the children. Out in the dark on a night at the end of October the children started talking about Halloween. You can imagine children giggling and joking and trying to scare each other as they sat chattering in the back of the car. At one point one of them let out an almighty scream and then one of the others made that sort of 'Whoooh!' scary pretend ghost noise. Slamming on the breaks the man driving the car screeched to a halt thinking that something was wrong. The car slithered in the rain made even worse by the fallen leaves on the road. As the car juddered to stillness everyone was silent and realised that they were alone on a dark lane with no lights and, worse still, having stopped so suddenly the car wouldn't start again. The man driving, the father of one of the children, turned to them and screamed in his anger asking them what they thought they were doing and to see what had happened and it would serve them right if some hobgoblin or ghost came to get them! He and his wife shouted at each other too but after she'd 'phoned on her mobile and tried to calm the children it was only about ½ an hour before someone came to help them. The gossip in the village though was awful by the next day – that he'd deliberately scared the children by telling scary stories, that a ghost had leapt out of the woods and attacked the car and that he was a dangerous driver. By the end of the week the couple had been told they couldn't drive other people's children home next time. Quite simply the man in the car probably shouted because he was just as scared as the children

There *are* times when we have to look beneath the news we first hear, in the village, at a party, in the newspaper, and then think carefully about what the real story may be – before we jump to conclusions. You know Halloween and gossip have one thing in common – they're a bit of history built up to become something that's not true! The familiar sinister symbols of ghosts and skeletons at Halloween come from the Druid festival at the end of harvest to remember the dead but have so influenced the American market to become the 'trick or treat' we see today.

However in the Church it became a time called All Saints' Day to celebrate the true lives of the saints, people who know their need of God, who help us think of the new life we are given by getting to know Him – now that's not gossip, or trick or a treat, but an eternal promise of hope. Perhaps many of us could find time to pause like this for a 'stand and stare' moment, to allow one experience to lead us to other reflections and realisations. In that place of pausing and reflecting we may begin to sense the presence of God and so be led to see Him more clearly and find ways of knowing Him more deeply.

Having led pilgrimages to the Holy Land on many occasions, she has great knowledge and interest in that country, now so bitterly divided. Maureen invited us to pray for peace between Israel and her neighbours and particularly to support with prayer those bereaved mothers, both Muslim and Jews who had lost family members in the fighting. Despite present uncertainties, Maureen is hoping to lead another pilgrimage next year, to visit sites which are holy to Christians, Muslims and Jews alike.

It is very important that we do not put any CARDBOARD into the WASTE PAPER container at the playing field location because the collectors then refuse the entire bin and we then loose the re-cycle money for the whole bin. This re-cycle rebate from the waste paper helps to keep the precept tax down and thus keeps our Council Tax as low as possible.

It is also worth noting that placing re-cycleable materials in your black box does not contribute to any rebate. Putting these objects into the appropriate bins at the playing field does create a rebate. With the present unreliable collection of our black boxes, although slightly inconvenient, it is clearly is of benefit to the village to use the bins at the playing field.

PROPOSED SPEED RESTRICTIONS FOR SEEND CLEEVE

I recently wrote to the Environmental Services Department requesting Speed Restrictions on the A361 through Seend Cleeve. I thought the feedback I had was quite interesting and wanted to share it with others.

The list of requests for speed limit changes was considered at the 22nd March 2006 meeting of the Environmental Advisory Panel. Following the recommendation of the Panel the Cabinet Member has agreed the nineteen new 30mph/40mph speed limits to be implemented in 2006/2007 with the £100,000 available.

The A361 has been added to the list of outstanding requests to be assessed when the promised revised guidance on the setting of local limits on rural roads is published by the Department of Transport. The revised guidance which will contain advice on speed limits for roads such as the A361 should be received shortly.

Following the assessment of the outstanding requests a programme of new speed restrictions will be prepared for consideration by the Advisory panel in March 2007.

OUR HERITAGE - THE STOKES FAMILY.

In May 1997 an excited Benjamin and Carolyn Stokes, from Alabama U.S.A. visited Holy Cross Church realising their ancestors had contributed to it's building. They planned to return, but tragically died in a car accident in New Zealand later that year.

In May this year, Benjamin's sister Gerry and husband Ted came from Florida to see Seend Church for themselves, and it was a very moving experience for them. They have kindly given me an interesting copy of 'A Genealogical Study 1312 - 1903 by Rev. John L. Stokes. 1854. Gerry's Grandfather. Below are some excerpts of it's contents:-

'1. In the time of Edward II., the year of the birth of Edward III., (father

- of the famous "Black Prince"), two years before the ever-memorable battle of Bannockburn, Adam de Stokke was married to Eva -. This was in 1312. He held the manors of Rushall (Rutishall) and Stokke, Wiltshire, England.
- Of this pair was born Thomas Stoke of Seend, Wilts, in the reign of Edward III
- 3. Of him came Thomas Stokes, (Seend)King Richard 11., 1381.
- 4.John Stokes, Seend. King Henry IV.
- 5. Thomas Stokes, of the same old family seat, in the time of Henry V.
- 6. John Stoke, of same place, in the third year of Henry VI., 1425.
- 7 Succeeded by Thomas Stoke,King Henry VII., 1495
- 8. His son, John Stokes, erected the chapel at Seend, and was buried there in 1498. He married Alice -, who sleeps beside him.
- His son, John Stokes, came next. He married Margery, daughter of John Nicholas of Rundwire, Wilts.
- 10. For nearly 200 years the family had resided in Wiltshire, but now comes a new settlement. Christopher Stokes, Stanshawes Place, Gloucestershire. d.1566......
- The line is continued at Stanshawes for about 235 years: Samuel Stokes married Isabella, daughter of Richard Codrington of Dodington. Gloucestershire.
 (English American line) Christopher Stokes (3) came to Virginia USA obtained a patent for land on Charles (York) river 21.7.1635 'a man of prominence........
- 15. John Stokes was the progenitor of the Carolina branches of the family
- 16. David Stokes J.P. of Lunenburg county' 1707.....

Various members of the Stokes family during the course of time were Church ministers, served in the army, and public life in the U.S.A..

.....

Taken from guide book 'Notes on monumental inscriptions' in Holy Cross Church.

'John Stokes (d 1498) and his wife Alice (d 1500) are pictured in the famous brass, now on the W. wall of the N. aisle. (Sadly one of these was stolen, Mr. Peter Hicks has made a remarkably good replica of the 3 brass items) The tradition that he was a clothier (probable in itself) seems to be based on the evidence of the shears and scissors which can be seen in the moulding of the W. window of the aisle, inside and out. John Stokes will asked that he should be buried 'in Capella mea noviter edificata et constructa in Capella de Sende' ('in my newly built chapel in the chapel of Seend', and he left money to embellish the chapel and for a priest to hold services there for the welfare of his soul and those of his parents and all the faithful departed. He also left money to the parish church in Melksham, the Vicar of Melksham (described as 'my curate'), and for repairing the roads in Seend, as well as bequests to his family. Alice Stokes also desired to be buried 'in the new chapel of Seend', and left money to Seend Church, Melksham church, and to the Rev. William Janyns, curate of Seend.

FEEL BETTER ABOUT PLASTIC

If, like me, you hate the amount of plastic our lives, then here's something to make you feel better: did you know that *polythene* is "ecofriendly and energy - efficient"? (The amount of energy used to make a paper cup is 10 times more than to make a plastic cup - which is made apparently from by-products of the oil cracking process.) However, none of us want it cluttering up the environment for eons, and so if you'd like to recycle it, here is somewhere you can send it.

First, though, it MUST be polythene - i.e. flexible, slightly stretchy, not crinkly; it's the plastic that comes as wrappers for all kinds of magazines and mail, and also it is the plastic 6 - pack rings that hold the cans together. Whether these be printed, or plain, or the rings, they can all go in together, but they **must not contain** any biodegradable bags, or any **paper labels**, and they must be **clean** of anything else, e.g..foodstuffs, sticky residues like glue. Keep it until you have a decent supply - stuff the bags into each other, then send them to: *Polyprint Mailing, Mackintosh Road, Rackheath Industrial Estate, Rackheath Norwich NR13 6LJ.*

(I have checked with the firm and they assured me that they are happy to receive the polythene, they need about 200,000 wrappers to make one tonne of recyclable waste.)

All this has to be done individually, although wouldn't it be good to have some sort of community scheme? Any ideas? Geraldine (828059)
