

#### Antoinette Elizabeth Swain (Bartley)

Antoinette was born on 23<sup>rd</sup> February 1954 and lived on The Lye with her parents Violet and Alfred Bartley. When she was 7 her father died, and she was brought up by her mother. She left school during her first year of the sixth form to take up a job in the library headquarters in Trowbridge. She was a member of the church choir in Seend and an active member of the Girl Guides, achieving her Queen's Guide award. She helped run the Seend Guide group for many years. Both Antoinette and her Mother were members of the Seend Handbell Ringers from the time of its formation, performing regularly throughout the country. The Swain family moved to Seend when Antoinette was just ten years old and got to know Antoinette through the Church and handbell ringing. Antoinette looked after her mother until her death in 1988.

Antoinette and Ian were married in 1990, and she moved to Todmorden near Halifax in West Yorkshire. She quickly established a new life and became a loyal member of the Church and Choral Society in the town. Both organisations gave her much pleasure.

In 1992 Heather was born. Antoinette made the decision to remain at home to bring up Heather. In 1996 the family hit the news headlines locally when Christopher was delivered on the bathroom floor by Ian. Everyone told Antoinette she was very brave – there was little choice, as I recall! Antoinette was a devoted, loving and caring wife and mum who took great care of, and pride in, our children.

Sadly in April 2005 she was diagnosed with cancer. Following a series of hopes and disappointments, we were told that all hope of a cure had passed during our summer holiday at the beginning of August. She has demonstrated great courage and strength during her illness, and received excellent medical treatment throughout. We were delighted that her last wish could be fulfilled when she died at home amongst her family on 25<sup>th</sup> October.

It was a moving moment as we sat in a packed St Mary's Church in Todmorden on 1<sup>st</sup> November at Antoinette's funeral service thinking that at exactly the same time, a service of remembrance was taking place in Seend Church over 200 miles away. Many thanks to Sacha, Pam and everyone who attended this service. A collection in Antoinette's memory has raised over £2000 to support two charities which meant a lot to her. The children and I visited Seend very briefly just a few days after the funeral, and will be back in the spring hopefully.

#### First Steps Benefice Parent & Toddler Church Service

This month's Parent & Toddler service at Seend will take place on Tuesday 5th December and from 2.15pm—2.45pm. All welcome. There will be no service in January, the first for the new year being 6th February.

#### FROM WHERE I STAND......

...when there's something we usually take for granted, or even usually ignore or just don't know much about, then it can be fruitful to look at it again and learn something new! Surprising though this may seem I really don't get time to cook properly except on my day-off and even then my culinary repertoire is quite small! However last Autumn I discovered a really sumptuous meal of roast pork with quinces - cooked with white wine, white wine vinegar, onions, garlic, chillies, bay leaves, a mix of muscovado and castor sugar - and 2 hours later a rich meaty dish with a stunning sauce! Until then to me 'quince' meant a line in a poem by Keats or a fruit you may sometimes see in a smart supermarket.



Now this Autumn, thanks to several friends from all over the Southwest, we have made this meal a firm favourite and several jars of quince jelly have been made too! You may know that the quince is an ancient fruit tree species, a relative of the apple and pear and one of the earliest known fruits. For over 4000 years quince trees have grown in Asia and the Mediterranean, the tree cultivated for fruit production from Greek and Roman times, now grown and eaten in many places across the world. A quince can look like a cross between an apple and pear with a rich golden colour when ripe and a strong fragrance sometimes smelling like a tropical fruit. Uncooked the skin is tough and the flesh is hard and unpalatable but when it's cooked the hard dry flesh turns light pink becoming softer and sweeter. Quinces are commonly made into preserves and jellies or can be used when a recipe needs pears or apples. Garden advice says pick them from September, the latest by mid-November, and store like apples. So let's hear it for the quinces!

Just like me learning about quinces from where I stand, when there's something we usually take for granted or even usually ignore or don't know much about, it can be fruitful to look at it again and learn something new! As we move through autumn to winter, to Advent, Christmas and the New Year, so it may be that many of us are just a bit guilty of letting the seasons drift by, take them for granted, even ignore them. Advent, through December, is a time to look, a season of watching and waiting to take time to look for God; a season of wilderness, if we are willing to use the time to travel within ourselves, to discover the place where Christ may be born; a season of wonder as we draw nearer, as we approach the manger and look in. We *can* approach Christmas with a full diary, a long shopping list and a busy family and we *can* approach Christmas with an empty house, a worried and lonely heart. For certain though we can all approach Christmas with an open, hopeful mind and heart, willing to look again at the familiar Christmas story, well-known Carols and traditions, ready to look again and think again about what all this may mean...for Christmas means 'God with us'.

From where I stand when there's something we usually take for granted, or even usually ignore or don't know much about then it can be fruitful to look at it again and learn something new! Perhaps many of us could find time to pause like this for a 'stand and stare' moment, to allow one experience to lead us to other reflections and realisations. In that place of pausing and reflecting we may begin to sense the presence of God and so be led to see Him more clearly and find ways of knowing Him more deeply.



#### SEEND COMMUNITY CENTRE AND CLUB

#### An Update

**First the Good News**. The mandatory requirement to move and replace the fuel tank has been met and a new double skinned one has been installed in a discreet position. The old (and inadequate boiler) has been removed and a new, more powerful one installed.

A range of new radiators has been fitted. The users of the main Hall will no longer need to wear their thermals for Skittles and other events. The recent frosty weather has already confirmed the benefits and efficiency of the new heating system.

Thanks to the generosity of the Parish Council and Awards for All, the cost of this work has been met from the grants that they have made to the Community Centre.

#### Now the Bad news.

The application for a grant from the Big Lottery Fund failed at the last hurdle to gain approval. This means that the generation of the cash needed for the work to meet the Health and Safety and Hygiene requirements in the kitchen and the toilets will be delayed as will the improvements to the insulation of the Hall and renewal of the furniture and decorations.

To help ease the problem, in terms of fund raising and time, and to keep the premises viable, volunteers to do some of the work are urgently needed. Friday mornings have been nominated for the working parties and I am delighted to tell you that these have already begun. However, more support is essential. Skills sought are minimal. Anyone capable of wielding a paint brush, a saw or even sand paper will be made more than welcome. Apart from the pleasures of the shared company and the knowledge that every hour of effort will improve the appearance and benefits offered by the premises to the people of Seend, these efforts will enable the Community Centre to stay open whilst the necessary cash is being raised. We cannot allow this valuable asset to suffer the same fate as the W.I. Hall so please show your support by coming along on Friday mornings (9.15---12.30pm) and spare us a few hours of your valuable time.

Always the optimists and with the Festive Season, approaching...is there a Father Christmas in Seend who would make a donation towards the cost of the outstanding work? It surely would be most gratefully received!

#### SEEND AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

Our second meeting of the year was on 10<sup>th</sup> October and was very well attended. The talk was given by Bob Swaffield, recently retired to Potterne, who without the use of slides or visual aids of any sort, and also without notes, painted a fascinating word picture of his work in a Victorian garden.

As a young boy in the early 1950's he became a garden boy at Cannizaro House in Wimbledon, owned by Edward Wilson, brother of the famous









Ernest. The 58 acre garden was run on strictly Victorian lines and he had to learn over the course of a long apprenticeship, slowly working up through the hierarchy, how to work in the many and varied areas of the garden. It contained a mixed orchard, a sunken garden, a water garden, herbaceous borders, herb borders, an acer walk, an Italian garden, woodland, ornamental lawns, rhododendron walks, tennis courts, a 4 acre kitchen garden and 18 greenhouses. There would be 30 to 40 house-guests each weekend and the garden would have to provide all the produce and flowers for the house and beautifully maintained gardens for the guests to walk in. When the family was in Scotland for the grouse season hampers of garden produce would be sent by rail each day. There was considerable emphasis on recycling and re-using everything, with no waste at all but also a frightening use of dangerous chemicals such as mercury, sulphur, nicotine, DDT, and carbolic acid. Mr Swaffield went into much detail of how things were done, more than there is space for here, but reminded many of us of The Victorian Garden T.V programme of some years ago. His talk was very much appreciated.

The competition, In the Red, was won by Joyce Brand, with Sylvia Ewin as runner- up.

#### Next meeting

On 12th December Jenny Witham will tell us about Gardens of the French Riviera and the competition will be a flowering or foliage potted plant. #### SEEND WI

The Speaker at our November meeting was Andrew Newman from the Wiltshire Air Ambulance who described the work that they do and showed a video film. He gave us a history of the Service and told us some very interesting facts. The Metropolitan Police first used an aeroplane to monitor the Derby day crowds in 1921! The police helicopter (a Gazelle) observed an accident at Beanacre in 1988. It landed and took the casualty to hospital and, as a result, the Wiltshire Air Support Unit was formed . A Bolkow BO105 was purchased and used for ten years. In 1999 the Service acquired a MD902 Explorer helicopter - the first in the U.K. It carries a crew of three and is one of only three Air Ambulances in the country that can operate at night. The Air Ambulance can reach anywhere in Wiltshire within 12 minutes from Devizes. It costs £1.4 million per year to operate - 25% of which is raised by donations.

There was a lovely display of beautifully wrapped Christmas gifts for Green Lane Hospital patients and the competition, 'A Green Lane Parcel', was won by Mrs. Joan Greenwood who will be presented with the EM Smith cup at our meeting on 13th December when the Speaker will be Mr Alistair Olver whose subject is 'Herbs, Winter Plants And Shrubs - Plus Christmas Arrangements'. The competition is 'A Handmade Christmas Card' and the Committee will be tea hostesses.

The Operation Christmas Child organisation is responsible for the "Little Boxes of Love" which are taken to the orphans and under-privileged children of Eastern Europe. Seend Branch of the MU has supported this work for several years and already this year shoe boxes have been begged from retailers, woolly hats knitted and toy boxes combed for colourful and interesting items to fill them. It was of great interest when members welcomed the October speaker, Hilary McFall who is responsible for organising the collection of the filled boxes in this county. She has also visited the countries where the boxes are distributed and had a fund of stories from those visits.

The boxes are like rays of sunshine. First they can be used as drums by finger tapping. Then the lid is raised it becomes a treasure trove. One Indian family could now send their children to school because they each had the necessary notebook and pencil. One helper gives a day a week to sharpening pencils. Tennis balls (from Wimbledon) are washed by machine and then sent. Small bright glove puppets with smiling and sad faces become a valuable talking aid. One boy refused to have the maker's label cut off his brand new coat - the first he had ever had. 40,000 boxes were sent last year, from the warehouse at Bowerhill. There they deal with all the checking and final packing of the boxes. Can you help with any of their work?

### **BITS'N'BOBS**

#### PAST TIMES – Frenny & Violet Hughes

Frenny and Violet's parents were both Romany Travellers who used to come through Bulkington in their horse drawn caravan to graze their horses on the Drove. They liked Bulkington so much that they decided to settle down here.

They bought a piece of land opposite the War Memorial and built a bungalow on it. Frenny and Violet's brother, Michael, had a wood yard which was situated near to where the Bus Shelter now stands. When Violet's Mother died they burnt her caravan down the Drove and all the travellers from far and wide came to Bulkington for the wake.

Frenny and Violet came back and forth to Bulkington, but still liked their caravan life so they bought a site near Swindon and much of their time was spent there. Both were very colourful characters – Frenny travelled all over the world, and Violet would carry all her worldly possessions with her in her bag, (gold sovereigns etc) even when going into the pub!

When Frenny died Violet had a vault built for his grave according to the custom of the Romany Travellers. They are buried together, in the Churchyard, with a pure gold cross in their grave.
