



# Kellys Directory Extract 1903

## Stratford Toney



STRATFORD TONEY is a parish, pleasantly situated on the river Ebele, 4 miles south-west from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, Cawden and Cadworth hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Salisbury union and county court district, rural deanery of Chalke (Chalke portion), and Salisbury archdeaconry and diocese. The church of St. Mary is a plain but ancient edifice of flint and stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and a western tower with pinnacles, containing 3 bells; there is a stained window, presented by Miss Easton, of Layton Manor, Yorkshire; the church was restored in 1882 at a cost of £625, and affords 84 sittings. The marriage and burial registers date from the year 1562 the baptismal registers from 1604. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £195, with residence and 77 acre of glebe, in the gift of Corpus Christi College, Oxford and held since 1899 by the Rev. Leonard Hughes M.A. of Corpus Christi College, Oxford. Col. John Purefoy Ellis-Jervoise, late of the 3rd Hussars, is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is gravel and chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and turnips. The area is 1,179 acres; rateable value, £429; the population in 1901 was 89 in the civil and 122 in the ecclesiastical parish.
