CHURCH

Small. Chancel of c 1200; see the masonry, the buttresses, the corbel-table, the one N lancet, and the good chancel arch. Shafted responds, pointed arch with two slight chamfers. C 14 tower arch, but otherwise the tower is of the C 17 and so are the long, transomed, straight-headed nave windows with round-headed lights. The date 1633 appears indeed in the roof. - West Door, also of c 1633. – PLATE. Chalice, 1684 – MONUMENTS. Late C14 effigy of a Knight, his vizor down – Brass demi-figure of a priest, c 1460, 19 in. long.

UPTON GREAT BARROW

1 ½ m. NE of Knook. Magnificent bell barrow with bank outside the ditch. Excavated by Colt Hoare, who found a primary cremation with a necklace of shale, amber and faience beads.


KNOOK CASTLE

On Knook Down. Rectangular univallate fort with entrance on the SE.

KNOOK BARROW

1 m. W of Knook Castle. An unchambered long barrow.
