WINTERBOURNE DANTSEY (or DAUNTSEY, or MIDDLE WINTERBOURNE), is a village and parish, situated in the Bourne valley, 4 miles north-east from Salisbury, 5 south-east from Amesbury and 2 south-south-west from Porton station on the South Western railway, in the Southern division of the county, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Salisbury county court district, Amesbury union, Amesbury rural deanery Alderbury portion, archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury.

The church of the parish was taken down in 1867 and the inhabitants use the church of Winterbourne Earls, built for the two parishes, which are united for ecclesiastical purposes: it was opened in 1868.

Here is a chapel used by the Methodist New Connexion.

Mrs Burtt, of the Manor House, is lady of the manor, and Mrs King Wyndham and C.E. Clark Esq., are chief landowners.

The soil is chalk; subsoil, same. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots.

The area is 1,188 acres; rateable value £932; the population in 1881 was 158.

FIGSBURY RING (or Clorus's Camp) is 1 mile south-east.

Letters arrive from Salisbury at 6.30am & 3pm; dispatched at 6.30pm. The nearest money order office is at Winterbourne Gunner.

The children of this parish attend the school at Winterbourne Earls.
