WINTERBOURNE DANTSEY (or DAUNTSEY, or MIDDLE WINTERBOURNE), is a village and parish, in the Bourne valley, 2 miles south-south-west from Porton station on the main line of the London and South Western railway, 4 north-east from Salisbury and 5 south-east from Amesbury, in the Southern division of the county, Alderbury hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Salisbury county court district, Amesbury union, rural deanery of Amesbury (Alderbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury.

The church of the parish was taken down in 1867 and the inhabitants that of Winterbourne Earls, to which the parish is annexed.

Here is a Methodist New Connexion chapel.

George Burtt Esq of the Manor House, is lord of the manor, and Richard Arthur Pleydell Bouverie-Campbell-Wyndham Esq of Exton, Hants, and C.E. Clark Esq. are chief landowners.

The soil is chalk; subsoil, same. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots.

The area is 1,185 acres; rateable value £982; the population in 1901 was 150.

FIGSBURY RING (or Clorus's Camp) is 1 mile south-east.

Letters arrive from Salisbury at 5am & 3.05pm, Sundays 5pm; dispatched at 1.45 & 7.15pm. The nearest money order & telegraph office is at Winterbourne Gunner, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile distant.

The children of this parish attend the school at Winterbourne Earls.
