

Post Office Directory Extract 1855 Winterbourne Stoke



WINTERBOURNE STOKE is a township, parish, and village, 5 miles from Amesbury west, and 9 from Salisbury north, in the Hundred of Branch and Dole, bishopric of Salisbury, Amesbury Union, South Wilts. The living is a vicarage, value £220, in the gift of Lord Ashburton; the Rev. Charles Lawford, M.A., is the present incumbent. The church is an ancient structure, in the early English style, with square central tower and 4 bells. In 1851 the population was 365; the acreage, 3,363. Lord Ashburton is lord of the manor.

The CONEGARTH, or Conegore, is three-quarters of a mile north. There are many barrows and earthworks, among which is Long Barrow.

Post Office – William Furmage, receiver. Letters arrive from Wilton at 10 a.m.; dispatched at 5 p.m. The nearest money order office is at Amesbury.
