

Post Office Directory Extract 1855

Bishopstone Swindon



Bishopstone, near Swindon, is a township and parish, in the Hundred of Ramsbury, Highworth Union, North Wilts, bishopric of Gloucester and Bristol; distant 7 miles from Shrivenham station, 3 miles south-west; 74 from London, 9 from Farringdon, and 7 east of Swindon; contained in 1851, 755 inhabitants, and 4,452 acres of land; the Bishop of Salisbury is lord of the manor, and Lord Holland, lessee under him. The church is a plain structure, with a square tower, containing a fine peal of 8 bells; the living in a vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop, value £200 per annum; the incumbent is the Rev. John H. Landon, M.A.; and his curate, the Rev. Henry F. Beasley, A.M.. The rectorial tithes and advowson were formerly attached to the prebend of Bishopstone in Salisbury Cathedral. There is a school, erected in 1850, mainly by the exertions of the Rev. Henry Beasley, the curate. In the old manor house a room was built for the entertainment of James II. On the tomb of Christopher Willoughby, in the chancel, is an epitaph setting forth that he was most happy with his first wife, but very unlucky with his second. There are several charities belonging to this parish, viz., £900 left by Mr. T. Goddard, for the education of the poor children of both sexes, and keeping in repair the tower of the church and bells; £110 per annum left by Christopher Willoughby Esq., in 1681, to be divided amongst the poor of the parish; also £15 per annum left by Gilbert Keate, Esq., to be divided amongst four poor persons belonging to the parish; with several others of trifling amounts. Bricks and tiles made here.

RUSLEY PARK is to the south. Starveall is 11/2 miles south-west; Lumby Down 1 mile south; Charlbury, 2 miles south-west.

POST OFFICE - Edward Lawrence, postmaster. Letters arrive through Farringdon, by messenger, ¹/₄ to 12 a.m.; dispatched at 4 p.m. The nearest money order office is at Swindon.

CARRIER - Daniel Tayler, from Idston, Berkshire, through Bishopstone to Swindon, every Monday; to Highworth every Wednesday; to Newbury, every Wednesday night; to Wantage, every Saturday
