

Post Office Directory Extract 1875 Heytesbury and Tytherington



Heytesbury is a station on the Great western railway, and parish, formerly a market town, in the Southern division of the county , hundred of its own name, Warminster union and county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Wylye, distant 118 miles from London, 18 north-west from Salisbury, and 4 south–east from Warminster. It is a small pleasant town, situated on the banks of the Wylye and borders of Salisbury Plain, consisting principally of one street. It was a prescriptive borough, governed by a bailiff and burgesses, and enjoyed a double representation till disfranchised by the Reform Act. The market is discontinued, but an annual fair is still held on the 14th May.

The church of St Peter and St Paul is collegiate, and possesses four prebends, but will cease to be so on the vacation of the three remaining prebendaries. It is a spacious cruciform edifice, chiefly Early English, and consists of chancel and chancel aisles, nave and aisles, north and south transepts, south entrance porch and low square tower. The pillars of the nave, which had fallen much out of the perpendicular, have been rebuilt, and also a part of the tower, which contains a fine peal of 6 bells and to which a new way of access has been made.

Some handsome Early English arches and columns, long hidden behind the plaster of the walls in the chancel, have been opened and repaired, the aisles, which formerly existed, rebuilt, and the high pitch of the original roof restored. The whole church has been re-seated with open seats. The cost of these works considerably exceeded £5,000. There are several stained windows; one at the eastern end (the gift of Lady Heytesbury) is a representation of the Birth, Death and Resurrection, and the memorial window in the north transept is the gift of the Hon. Mrs Robert Daly. The register dates from 1653. The living is a vicarage, with that of Knooke annexed, joint yearly value £350, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held by the Rev. John Knight, M.A., of Queen's College, Cambridge, prebendary of the prebend of Tytherington, in Heytesbury.

Here is a National school; also a place of worship for Independents. Here is a hospital or almshouse, the gift of Lady Hungerford, of very ancient foundation, for twelve poor men, one woman, and a custos, who must be in holy orders, and act as chaplain.

On Cotley Hill, north-west of the town, is a tumulus, surrounded by an entrenchment, 480 feet in diameter. On the summit of another hill, at no great distance, is Scratchbury Camp, above a mile in circumference. About 2 miles northeast is Knooke Castle, an earthwork similarly situated. On Knooke Down, the sites of two British villages are indicated by signs of early habitation, and connected by Old Ditch, probably a British road, running from Westbury Leigh to Durnford, on the Avon. About a quarter of a mile from Knooke Castle is Bowls Barrow, and on the north bank of the Wylye, Golden Barrow.

Near the town is Heytesbury House, the seat of Lord Heytesbury. The house was partly rebuilt about 1784, and the grounds are extensive. Lord Heytesbury is lord of the manor and sole owner of the parish.

The soil is light, partly clay; subsoil, chalk and stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

The area is 5,030 acres; gross estimated rental, £7,087; rateable value, £6,140; the population in 1871 was 1,094.

Tytherington, about 1 mile south from Heytesbury, is a hamlet, and prebend in the Collegiate Church of Heytesbury. The church of St James is an old stone building, about 19 feet wide and 50 feet long, with stone covered lean-to roof and bell cot containing 1 bell. The interior is fitted with open benches on either side, and will seat about 70 people. The Rev. John Knight, M.A., of Queen's College, Cambridge, is the prebendary. The population and area are included with Heytesbury.
